DRCF & STEWARDSHIP NEWS

We have been hard at work to bring the vision of the Dead River Community Forest to life. We knew that in order to see the trails take shape at the Bayous parcel, we would need to begin with the first step... the one at the trailhead! By improving the road and parking area, we aimed to create a more inclusive environment- one that accommodates visitors of varying abilities while also minimizing disturbances to the surrounding land and neighbors. Thanks to the incredible dedication of our partners, local contractors, volunteers, and funders we were able to successfully complete phase one phase one of our 'DRCF: Access for All' project by improving the existing road and creating a gravel parking lot at the adjacent Vielmetti-Peters Reserve. This was no easy feat and included permitting, culvert installations to protect waterways, manual tree removal, hired machinery, and fence installation to guide access! The road will be seasonal, and we will reassess its readiness for use after the spring runoff next year.

Trail maintenance also comes with its challenges – during the process, a closer inspection of the Midway Creek bridge revealed critical damage. In order to ensure the protection of the Dead River watershed and the safety of visitors on the trail, the bridge required immediate removal. Since September, our team has been diligently working on developing a comprehensive solution, one that not only restores access but also reflects sustainable and environmentally responsible practices.

In the face of a missing bridge, we find more than just a need to span the physical gap; the bridge offers a tangible symbol of our collective commitment to bridging connections and fostering community through the DRCF project. Just as the trail network envisions linking two remarkable preserves, we too must envision how linking forces with others can build this keystone bridge that will bring the trails to life. In light of this challenge, we have called upon the help of local partners to develop a work plan to engineer and build a new bridge over Midway Creek. We hope to begin this project come next field season. In the meantime, the trails beyond the Midway Creek crossing remain closed to protect the waters and hikers' safety.

We would like to extend our gratitude to everyone who has dedicated their expertise, voice, financial resources, and hearts to making this Community Forest possible. *Thank you for your unyielding support and passion for this endeavor*. Let us stay focused, adaptable, and true to our mission as we take next steps in this and other stewardship projects to come.

Accreditation Renewal

Every five years, accredited land trusts must apply for reaccreditation with the Land Trust Alliance Commission. While it seems like just vesterday, UP Land Conservancy was first awarded accreditation in 2018. In preparation for our 2023 renewal application, staff and board members have been evaluating and updating policies, organizing documentation for projects, and meticulously inspecting properties. After over a year of planning and assembling our application, we officially submitted for accreditation renewal on October 31st (before promptly changing into our Halloween costumes). We estimated that in total, we spent about 700 hours on the application alone! Thank you to all of our staff, Board, and volunteers who helped us throughout this process!

This summer, we welcomed recent NMU graduate Casey Stevens as our summer Stewardship Intern. Casey spent her summer visiting various UPLC properties and writing our annual monitoring reports for each property she visited.

"I have always found nature to be an excellent teacher - with this summer being no exception. I have become a better observer, and I have learned to look more critically at what is happening in front of me. I have had to think about how the conditions of various properties might have been affected by past land use, current human impacts, or adjacent land activities.

Furthermore, I've had to think about what kind of repercussions these factors may have on both the people and wildlife that depend on these parcels of land. I am walking away from this internship with a deeper sense of how every component of a natural system relies on one another, and the role that humans play in those systems. Just as we depend on nature for resources, solace, or recreation, nature relies on us to practice good stewardship."
